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## What it Means to be a Library Assistant

Geoff Kirkpatrick, Director of the Bethlehem Public Library, is teaching a graduate course on Public Libraries at the University at Albany. He asked Michele Giuffre, Bethlehem Public Library and Michele Matthews, Rensselaer Polytechnic Institute, Folsom Library to speak to the students during his April 3, 2013 class.

Geoff asked us to speak about our relationships with librarians in our organizations, the different terminologies used by library assistants and to answer questions from the class. Rather than a presentation, we held an informal "fireside chat" with the students.

We spoke about our duties, length of library service, and professional organizations for library assistants. Many of the students had never worked in a library but several had and questioned the hierarchy in our respective libraries.

We also discussed the term "professional" and how offensive it is to library assistants to be considered "non-professionals".

There was a lively discussion and hopefully we were able to give some insight into what it means to be a Library Assistant.


I would like to take this opportunity to announce that NYSLAA has given a grant to the New York State Libraries Disaster Fund.




The New York State Libraries Disaster Fund provides financial support to libraries in New York State that have suffered damage or have been destroyed by the disasters of recent years.

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## Library Assistants' Day Take 2

We were all set to attend the Fall Library Assistants' Day event in Syracuse, NY, sponsored by SCRLC, CLRC, RRLC, NNYLN and WNYLRC. Not to be...October 26, 2012 came along with a storm forcing the event to be cancelled. Happily, the sponsors were able to re-group and re-schedule the event for April 30, 2013. As in the past, the program did not let us down!

The Keynote Speaker; Allison Sloan, Library Journal's 2010 Paralibrarian of the Year, from Reading Public Library, Reading, MA, spoke on being a "Paralibrarian". I was thrilled to hear her tell of the influence of Dorothy Morgan and NYSLAA's Certificate of Achievement Program on Massachusetts' Paralibrarian Section.

Edward Gancarz was an energetic presenter and kept us engaged as he spoke on coping with change. He mentioned being a better listener and I have been working on that skill since then. In the first Breakout Session, I selected *Library Security*. Two presenters spoke on physical security in their libraries and one spoke on internet security. Their tips and suggestions were very helpful in today's climate.

My day was completed with a performance by Dennis Heaphy, Ellis Island Museum of American Immigration, and four attendees of the conference. Mr. Heaphy portrayed, Boris Krasnikov, an actual Russian Immigrant at Ellis Island, one attendee introduced Mr. Krasnikov and three portrayed the judges. They gave us an opportunity to sit through a mock trial that he would have had to experience. allowed to ask questions of Mr. Krasnikov and in the end we could give our opinions on if he stayed in America or was sent back. The group and the judges agreed he could stay. At the end, Mr. Heaphy stated that Mr. Krasnikov was actually sent back to Russia because his brother's employer had paid for his passage.

As in the past, I felt this event was educational on a number of levels. I would encourage you to attend in the fall as they will be putting it back on schedule.

As much as I would have liked to, I couldn't attend ALL the breakout sessions. Too bad, I'm sure the two sessions I had to pass on were as informative and well presented as the ones I sat in on. I think applying social media for personal use can be daunting and confusing but implementing it in our libraries adds dimensions and possibilities of use I had just never considered. Thanks to Gwen Glazer, Nancy Howe, Angela Pierpaoli and Clare Rauch my horizons have been broadened to include a much better understanding of Facebook, Pinterest, Twitter, etc. and more importantly, I think, how patrons see these opportunities and respond to them.

Our library at JCC has introduced thousands of eBook titles into our collection in a very short amount of time. It's been a big and fast learning curve for us as we figure out things about MARC records and eBooks and access for patrons. Inga Barnello, from an academic library and Jennifer Schlossberg, from a public library presented their point of view on the role, function, implement, and distribution of eBooks. Their explanation of the programs necessary to pull the eBook experience off helped me better understand the burgeoning environment in which all libraries are beginning to exist.

The Conference is a couple weeks away and there are a few things to remember.

We will be in the Adirondacks so come prepared for all kinds of weather and the beautiful outdoors. You might consider laying as temperatures can change dramatically from day to evening. *Don't forget your insect repellant!* 

Since we will be staying at the High Peaks Resort, I was curious about the current rates for tipping. I checked the rates on Oprah's site <a href="https://www.oprah.com/money/Guide-to-Tipping">www.oprah.com/money/Guide-to-Tipping</a> and on the TripAdvisor site

www.tripadvisor.com/Travel-g191-s606/United-States:Tipping.And.Etiquette.html They have very similar recommendations. The following information is from TripAdvisor: \$1-5 for bellhops, doormen, and parking valets, \$1 per coat for coatroom attendants, and \$2-5 per night for housekeeping. Their suggestions for waiter staff at sit-down restaurants and bartenders: 10% usually means you are very unhappy, 15% usually means all was ok, 20% for excellent, 25% for outstanding. 15% and over is considered "normal".
