11. Fake News Phenomenon Robert Berkman

Although librarians have always been at the forefront in teaching strategies for evaluating information sources, the recent explosion of interest in “fake news” is providing new challenges. This session will analyze what the real problem is, identify what’s new, and share strategies and tools to provide students so they can be more critical thinkers and better identify hoaxes and intentionally created misinformation on social media. Learn what librarians around the country are doing and brainstorm additional strategies.

12. It’s Not Me It’s You: Customer Service for Front-Line Library Staff Amanda Perrine

As the face of the library, it is essential for front-line staff to consistently provide excellent customer service. This session will discuss the importance of customer service, how to effectively communicate with all types of patrons, and self-care for staff in high patron-contact positions.

13. Safety Security & Self-Defense for the Workplace - Part 1 April McCloud

This workshop will focus on safety and security specifically tailored for the unique circumstances of libraries, with a brief tutorial on practical, hands-on self-defense techniques. We will examine methods for increasing your library’s and your personal safety. This includes how to use customer service to meet your safety and security goals, increasing your basic personal safety knowledge, and briefly discussing how to use the ability to read body language to your advantage.
