

End of Annual Reports

Award Nominations

Each year, NYSLAA seeks nominations from its members for each of these awards.

The Executive Council reviews the nominations in April of each year and notifies the recipients. The awards are presented at the annual conference in June.

Craig Koste Award for Outstanding Service

In 1992 the Executive Council created "The NYSLAA Award for Outstanding Service" specifically for New York State library assistants who are members of NYSLAA. Its name was changed in 1995 to honor Craig Koste, a library assistant who passed away and bequeathed an endowment to NYSLAA. The award recognizes those library assistants who have distinguished themselves by their service to our organization and to the library assistants of New York on either a state or local level. A stipend of \$100 will be given to the library of the winner for collection development.

Ray Murray Award

The Ray Murray Award was established in 1989 to recognize a librarian, library director, trustee, board member or any individual who has demonstrated outstanding support to library assistants.

Ray Murray began his library career at the University of Minnesota in 1961. He started at circulation and later transferred to acquisitions. While at Minnesota, Ray attended library school. He came to SUNY Oswego in 1975. With Ray's help, a planning committee from SUNY Oswego, SUNY Cortland, and the University of Rochester brought about the 1977 conference, laying the groundwork for NYSLAA.

Ray left New York in 1980 where he had been the library director at Upsala College in New Jersey and Cardinal Stretch College in Milwaukee. He became the director of the Essex-Hudson Regional Library Cooperative in Newark, New Jersey in 1986. The New Jersey Cooperative is very similar to New York's Three R's Organization. One of Ray's first projects in New Jersey was to bring about a conference for library assistants at Seton Hall in 1987.

To nominate someone for either award, please compile a packet including: your nomination letter, supporting letters, and any other pertinent documentation. The deadline for the submission is March 31st. See nyslaa.org for more information.

The Eileen Lemley Conference Scholarship (ELCS), previously known as the NYSLAA Conference Contest, was renamed to honor the memory of Eileen Lemley who passed away while attending the 2014 conference. Eileen loved working in the library and attending NYSLAA conferences. The recipient will receive a full conference registration, up to two night's lodging, the mixer, and one tour of your choice. Entries will be accepted from March 1st to March 31st. Applicants must complete a form and write an essay on "what NYSLAA means to me and why I want to attend the annual conference." Only members who do not receive any funding from their library may apply.

Chapter 5: Rolling Down the Chemung River

"Let us endeavor so to live so that when we come to die even the undertaker will be sorry."

- Mark Twain

Come join me this beautiful autumn season at the "place of the horns," as the Algonquin Native Americans called it. I am speaking of course about Chemung County, so named for the Chemung River where the native





tribes would often find the tusks of mammals clustered along its banks. Over the years, Chemung County has received its fair share of notables and achievements: astronaut Eileen Collins of Elmira, NY, was the first woman to pilot a space shuttle; Ernie Davis was the first African American to win the Heisman Trophy; and

of course fashion icon Tommy Hilfiger, also born in Elmira. Chemung County holds the title of "National Soaring Capital of America" and contains the world's largest sailplane collection. But the county's most incredible claim to fame is none other than Mark Twain himself. With this stop in Chemung County, we

are proud to pay homage to one of America's most celebrated writers with this installment of *New York: A Literary Map*.

Mark Twain is virtually a household name in America. When it comes to children's literature, his books such as *The Adventures of Huckleberry Finn* and *The Adventures of Tom Sawyer*



are a fundamental prerequisite. I can still clearly recall the Christmas morning when I received my copy of *Tom Sawyer* and began reading it instantly, chuckling at the scene where Tom hires his friends to white-wash the fence a chore meant to be his punishment for skipping school.

Mark Twain's brilliant writing came to define the great American novel. He was praised by everyone from his peers, American Presidents, and even European royalty. This writer, lecturer, entrepreneur and publisher was hailed by William Faulkner as "the father of American literature."

A Stellar Approach.

Born on November 30th, 1835 in Florida, Missouri, Samuel Langhorne Clemens entered this world in a blaze of glory, the same day that Haley's Comet came to pass by Earth. At first, young Samuel didn't have such a strong start. His health often kept him shut-in until age nine when he overcame his ailments. At age 12, he quit school to become a printer's apprentice. Two years later, he found work at his brother Orion's newspaper as a printer and editorial assistant, where he discovered his passion for writing.

At age eighteen, he left Missouri for New York to become a full time printer and join the newly-minted International Typographical Union as well as the printers union. The next decade would see him travelling about the country and the world before briefly settling down in the West to become a failed miner. He became a writer for *The Territorial Enterprise* in Nevada, and it was there he took on his famous satirical pen name Mark Twain, a Mississippi River term from his days of becoming a riverboat pilot in Missouri. "Mark twain" was a phrase the leadsman would yell out to measure the river's depth, in this case, twelve feet deep.

Riverboat pilot, miner, world traveler, writer; Mark Twain certainly led a life of adventure himself, much like his characters. So how did he come to establish roots in New York? In 1867, he met his wife Olivia Langdon at a Charles Dickens reading in New York City. She came from a wealthy, liberal family in Elmira, NY. At first, she rejected his marriage proposal. However, they later became engaged and married in February of 1870. The marriage produced four children. The family kept a cherished summer home called Quarry Farm in Elmira. But it was more than just a family

vacation. For Mark Twain, it was a personal quiet sanctuary that afforded him retreat, privacy and a sense of home which he longed for after his many travels. It was the place where he wrote his two best known works *The Adventures of Tom Sawyer* and its sequel, *The Adventures of Huckleberry Finn*. While sitting on his porch every evening, which overlooked



the Chemung River, Twain said "once or twice each night, we'd see a Steamboat slipping along in the dark. And every now and again, she'd belch a whole world of sparks up out of her chimney. And they would rain down in the river. And look awful pretty." It is easy to see how the picturesque Chemung would have stirred up his imagination to write about his childhood by the Mississippi and create the adventures of Tom Sawyer and Huckleberry Finn.

What could be more fitting for Halloween than a visit to the cemetery? In true eerie fashion, Mark Twain predicted his own death in 1909 when he heard of Haley's Comet making its 70-year approach:

"I came in with Halley's Comet in 1835. It is coming again next year, and I expect to go out with it. It will be the greatest disappointment of my life if I don't go out with Halley's Comet. The Almighty has said, no doubt: 'Now here are these two unaccountable freaks; they came in together, they must go out together'."

On April 21st, 1910, Twain's prediction came true. He passed away of a heart attack in Redding, Connecticut a day after Haley's comet passed by the Earth. Buried with his wife's plot in the Woodlawn Cemetery in Elmira, NY. His grave is adorned with a twelve-foot (two fathoms, or "mark twain") monument, commemorating his life and work.
