Workshop Session I 10:00 - 11:30

1.Be Creative: CMoG Sandblasting Workshop Corning Glass (Held offsite at Corning Glass. \$13.00 extra fee on Registration form. Limit 40) In this introduction to the art of sandblasting, you can be creative and apply any design to a wine glass using stickers and tape. The glass is then sandblasted, which creates a frosted look by scarring the surface with fine grains of sand propelled by compressed air. Museum staff will help you make your sticker design permanent on the glass. No heating or cooling is required, and you can take it home with you.

2. Book Protection/Repair, I Kary Barth

(Must register for both Pt.1 and Pt.2, limited to 25 participants)

Learn techniques for extending shelf life on circulating materials, such as: reinserting loose pages, broken spines, torn header caps, and torn pages. **Each participant is asked to bring**: one or two like new paperback books for covering; a hardbound book w/book jacket to cover; a stapled book or magazine; one hardbound book that needs repair; and a hardbound book without a book jacket. Each participant will be provided with a free sample packet of materials and be entered in a drawing for a deluxe paperback protection kit (retail value, \$113.00.)

3. The Enemy in the Room: Understanding Our Opioid Epidemic Dr. Tiffany Welch

Opioid drug abuse and related fatalities are increasing in our society and in our communities. People of all walks of life are affected. This session will focus on raising your awareness of the issue and will cover some of the necessary resources available along with steps we can take to combat it.

4.ALMA/PRIMO Show and Tell Kelly Bliss Ben Hogben David Schuster

Many libraries, including all of SUNY, will soon be migrating to the Ex Libris products Alma and Primo for their library management and discovery systems. This panel will present on their individual Alma and Primo migration projects and share their experiences of preparing and working through the migration and implementation process. Attendees will see system functionality through live demos of sites.

5.Connecting Family Literacy with Community Partners Linda George

This interactive workshop will highlight how the Family Literacy program of Pro Action of Steuben and Yates, Inc. collaborates with community partners to create a culture of literacy and how your community can create partnerships. The "Red Book Shelf" project, Summer Reading partnerships, Family Resource Centers and Community Literacy Events will be featured as successful partnerships in our community.

16. Right Here in River City -**James Truxon**

The past five years have shown that Information Security is becoming more and Misdirection in the Digital Age more relevant to users that have traditionally fell safely below the radar of digital miscreants. In this session, we'll examine a variety of current risks, a few methods of mitigating those risks, and take some wildly unfounded glances into the future capabilities of both the attackers and the defenders.

17. Shopping for a Living – Using **EDI for Acquisitions Christine Havens**

Often librarians select the materials but it is the Assistant's job to acquire them. Computer technology allows the Assistant to rapidly place orders and notify patrons that the hottest titles are on their way. EDI ordering is a methodology which streamlines the acquisition process. ILS is only half of the EDI process. The other half is the vendor. A watchful eye is required to help the ILS computer talk to the vendor computer. Includes a discussion of general concepts of EDI ordering using hands on examples with Sierra, an ILS interface, and sample vendors.

18. Environmental Reading **Program Fred Stoss**

Summer reading programs help children improve their reading skills. Adding a nature theme can increase awareness of the environment. Learn how to introduce children in grades 6 to 8 to concepts of ecology and environmental quality. This encompasses some of the concepts derived from the No Child Left Behind Act and influences from Richard Louv's book, "Last Child in the Woods." Attendees will receive "Nonformal Environmental Education Programs: Guidelines for Excellence" (a few in Spanish will be available). The idea is to stimulate interest in environmental education through reading and experimental learning, and sustain that interest.
