Written regional reports are requested from the regional representatives prior to the conference. We also invited the representatives to present a brief summary at the conference.

Rochester Regional Library Council Wendy Freier

The Rochester Regional Library Council (RRLC) Library Assistants Group sponsors two half-day workshops and two evening workshops annually. We also hold 4 planning sessions in addition to these workshops. We currently hold two of our four annual meetings at 5:30 pm in conjunction with RRLC's Monday Night Pizza Series.

Since our last conference we have offered the following half day sessions:

October 18th - The Challenging Colleague:

Important Conversations and Successful Outcomes Presenter: Ben Hogben

This workshop discussed the ways in which one can:

- Learn about different personality types as they relate to communication
- Learn how our style of communication may affect the outcome of a conversation
- Discuss how communication might be misinterpreted, changing the intent of a message

May 29th - Using Family Search & Planning a Genealogy Vacation

Larry Naukam presented a fun session covering two genealogy topics: Using FamilySearch and Planning a Genealogy Vacation.

FamilySearch:

What's your family history? In this genealogy class we learned the ins and outs of one of the world's largest free online resources, FamilySearch.org.

A. Learn to navigate the FamilySearch website to help you find your roots!

This session covered how to:

- Ask questions that elicit important family history information
- Record names, dates, places, and sources on Ancestor Charts and Family Group Sheets
- Use online databases for locating family history information
- Use Google search engine to find web pages and FamilySearch.org content containing information on your ancestors

B. Planning a Genealogy Vacation:

In this workshop, Larry shared what he wishes someone had told him before he planned his first genealogy vacation. Learn where to look, what to expect, and Larry's advice on conducting research.

This session will cover how to:

- Plan visits and follow best practices when going to local or out of town resources
- Collect vital records documenting births, marriages, and deaths
- Locate other documentation about families such as census, probate, church, and military records
- Communicate with other researchers gathering information on your surname (last name) or geographic area
- Learning objectives:
- Learn to locate family history information and gather documentation to confirm the accuracy of their information.
- Learn best practices when doing on-site research.

The two evening sessions included:

September 18th - **Instagram** in the **Public Library** Instagram is a great social media tool that many libraries

are using to connect with their users, authors, and each other. But it's not only for its innovative approach to photo sharing that libraries are using Instagram: this social media platform is growing faster than Twitter, Facebook, and Pinterest combined. Laura and Annalise gave an innovative, creative, and fun glimpse on how to make the most of your library's Instagram account.

May 14th - Fine Free Panel Discussion

Interns have been hard at work digitizing a number of local collections uploaded to the New York Heritage website. Take a look, if you haven't already.

CLRC offers two great financial opportunities. The Professional Development Award reimburses a library staff member for conference expenses or online education. The New Initiatives Grant covers the cost for libraries that want to implement a creative program idea. Both of these opportunities are reviewed on a quarterly basis. The next deadlines are June 30, September 30 and December 31, with recipient selection soon after the deadline.

The Library of the Year and Library Staff All-Star award nominations are due by June 30. There are four categories - Academic, Public, School and Special. Recognition (and awards) are given at the CLRC annual membership meeting and conference. This year, it will be held at Vernon Downs on October 25.

New York Libraries' will have a booth at the New York State Fair. This will be our 5th year!!! The 2018 Fair runs from August 22 to September 3. Western New York Library Resources Council

The Western New York Library Assistants Committee (WNYLA) presents workshops and networking events with the support of the Western New York Library Resources Council (WNYLRC), and is a standing committee of that council. Even though membership on the committee is only open to support staff, all our events are open to anyone who wishes to attend.

WNYLA usually holds one or two networking events that we call GTKY (Getting to Know You) a year and usually a workshop, geared toward the interests of library assistants, staff and clerks.

We had two GTKY's in the summer of 2017. The first was a tour of the Forest Lawn Cemetery including the archives. That was held on 6/21/17. The second one was held on 8/2/17 and was a Buffalo River Historical Tour. This was a boat tour featuring the history of the Buffalo River, the Erie Canal and the grain elevators that are found all along the river front. These were two of our most successful events. I received many emails regarding both these events telling us what a great job the committee did with both tours.

We did not hold any workshops in 2017. It is sometimes difficult to plan workshops when we have a very small number of committee members.

Each of our networking events usually includes a wonderful speaker/tour guide, a tour of the libraries/ art gallery or historical site. If there is adequate space on site, we have refreshments, and basket raffles. These events have always been very successful and well-attended.





Mansfield Professor and Daughter Give Presentation on Opioid Epidemic

MANSFIELD, PA — Tiffany Welch, chair and field education director of the Department of Social Work at Mansfield University, and her daughter, Micaiah, gave a presentation entitled "The Enemy in the Room: Understanding Our Opioid Epidemic" at the New York State Library Assistants' Association (NYSLAA) 40th Annual Conference, held in Corning, NY on June 6-8.

Micaiah graduated from Williamson High School earlier this month and is enrolled at MU as a Secondary Education/ Math major.

Their presentation focused on raising awareness of the issue of opioid addiction and some of the resources available and steps that can be taken to combat it.

"Beyond the family system, our schools and libraries have a huge responsibility as an educational system to put



prevention efforts in place, but we must first make them available to them," Tiffany Welch said. "To be able to present alongside Micaiah, who has personally lost her biological father to this epidemic, was inspiring and it gives me hope that there are many other young people like her who have a strong desire to educate others on the topic of preventing drug use. I can't say enough about how important it is that while we are breaking the stigma and providing services to those already affected that we must take the time to educate on the importance of prevention in order to stop the cycle of continued misuse."

"It was life changing to be able to share my own experience and knowledge with others who are now motivated to go back to their communities, states, and countries, to implement the new ideas we had shared, which will hopefully change even more lives for the better," Micaiah Welch said.

This is the second time the mother and daughter have presented on the topic. They made a presentation at the School Social Workers Association of America (SSWAA) National Conference held in Columbus, OH in March.
