




We are hoping that we can reschedule the same conference venues and speakers for 2021.

Monday Night Workshops

September 16, 2019 Tour of the URMC Edward G. Miner Library History of Medicine Section

Presenter: **Meredith Gozo**, Curator, Rare Books & Manuscripts Librarian

On your visit to the Miner Library History of Medicine Section, we will share with you a number of resources that draw on the highlights of our rare books and manuscripts. The Miner Library houses a significant collection of early anatomical atlases that were instrumental to advances in the study and understanding of the human body, and several of these will be on display for you. You will also have the chance to see some seminal works in medical history, rare ephemera in popular medicine, items from our photographic collections, original documents and objects from distinguished faculty whose papers are in our archives, and medical artifacts that reflect medical practices of days gone by.

Participants will learn about the historic resources housed at the E.G. Miner Library.

Half-Day Workshops

October 8, 2019 Decoding the Alphabet Soup: Learning about the LGBTQIA Community

To be a true ally to the LGBTQIA community it is important to educate yourself. This workshop will cover terminology, implicit bias, the difference between sexual orientation and gender identity, and the issues that are unique to the LGBTQIA community.

In the Trenches: Combating Controversy and

Censorship

Presenters: Jennifer Stickles and Michelle La Voie

Controversy and censorship are nothing new to libraries. However, with social media providing a mask of anonymity for keyboard warriors, libraries increasingly confront situations where the programs they offer are being targeted for censorship. Library staff and administrators may find themselves facing off with irate patrons, protesters, and even threats of violence. Using real experiences, participants will learn how to handle these situations, including how not to fight censorship with censorship.

This workshop will help participants learn how to interact with the press, local police, community partners, and teach them how to rally the support of their trustees and staff.

Central New York Libraries Resources Council (CLRC)

The Central New York Library Resources Council (CLRC) opened a communication network among the region's Library Assistants, Paraprofessionals and Support Staff through a Special Interest Group (LA SIG). The group began in March and has been meeting weekly through Zoom.

The LA SIG interests include:

- * furthering the professional development and job enrichment of support staff
- * enhancing the professional image of support staff within the library community

Western New York Library Assistants (WNYLA)

The Western New York Library Assistants Committee (WNYLA) presents workshops and networking events with the support of the Western New York Library Resources Council (WNYLRC) and is a standing committee of that council. Even though membership on the committee is only open to support staff, all our events are open to anyone who wishes to attend.

WNYLA usually holds one or two networking events that we call GTKY (Getting to Know You) a year and usually a workshop geared toward the interests of library assistants, staff and clerks. We do sometimes have a difficult time holding events and workshops since sometimes our numbers dwindle down to three or four members, but we do the best we can.

Our networking events for 2019 included a tour of the Albright Knox Art Gallery and a behind-the-scenes tour of the Richardson Olmsted Complex. This took place on June 25, 2019 and we had 19 people in attendance.

Our second GTKY took place on October 23, 2019. It was also a combination tour of the Buffalo Religious Arts Center and the Buffalo Inactive Records and Research Facility. We had 14 attendees.

Our activities for 2020 were nonexistent for the beginning of the year due to the COVID-19 pandemic. We were considering doing online tours and would have if things didn't begin to re-open. Online, of course, is really not the same as seeing, touching and admiring in person along with being able to network with colleagues. Some venues we are considering for fall tours are the Karpeles Museum and the Herschell Carrousel Museum. Our plan is also to have a Zoom webinar on climate change.

During our 2019 - 2020 LASSA Regional year, we saw the departure of our two long standing LASSA committee members — both served as previous Conveners - **Rita Gregory** and **Mildred Graham**. They will be missed, and we wish them the absolute best with their current activities!

Our group continued to schedule meetings using MeetUp, which encouraged and obtained new membership. We also continued to work closely with Davis Erin Anderson, Assistant Director for Programs and Partnerships at METRO, keeping her informed of our group's progress and goals. Some of our meetings were scheduled at METRO's headquarters at 599 11th Avenue, New York City.

In November 2019, we held our annual food drive. In lieu of food items, a monetary donation was made to the "Feed the Community" event, sponsored by the Union Grove Missionary Baptist Church.

In December 2019, we held our annual toy drive (picture attachment included). Our donated toys were made to the Little Rock Baptist Church. Our theme for our 2020 LAD (Library Assistants' Day) celebration was "Finding Your Place at the Library - Library Support Staff and Their Contributions."

We secured Terrance Neal, VP for the NY Public Library's Human Resources Department, as our keynote speaker. Our scheduled workshops included: "Health & Wellness," Dealing with Conflict," "Social Security/Retirement," "Financial Planning," "Student Debt," "Active Shooter," and "Gender Diversity in the Workplace."

Unfortunately, during March 2020, LASSA and the world was affected by the COVID19 pandemic, which took many lives. METRO shut down their office, all public events were canceled, and non-essential employees ceased to report to work on-site.

Our June 2020 monthly LASSA meetings were conducted via ZOOM. We discussed ways on how to move our group forward (possible virtual workshops) within society's "new normal."

We are also in need of a Treasurer as Carrie Goetz has stepped down.


Michele Matthews will be stepping down by the end of the year as Coordinator of the Review Board for the Certificate of Achievement Program.

From the Spanish Flu to Covid-19 in Libraries

Check out the article posted in the New England Region of the National Network of Libraries of Medicine back in October 2019 https://news.nnlm. gov/ner/2019/10/02/a-librarian-can-help-in-a-crisis. It discusses the differences in how libraries during the Spanish Flu struggled with closures and dramatic drops in circulation versus the technological resources available from libraries today. This was written before the Covid-19 pandemic but lists resources relevent to today. Also cited in the article is a reference to Nora Quinlan's article *In Flew Enza* that is available on Jstor. She states, "When the flu pandemic hit, many libraries imposed limited access in response to quarantine orders. Across the country, circulation statistics dropped an average of 10%. Libraries already strapped by staff enlistments saw employees sickened, work time lost, and even the death of staff. Library buildings were utilized for projects for related to combating the pandemic, including meeting space and work areas for volunteers."

During the Covid-19 pandemic we have seen our libraries closed with no access to print materials, but library services and resources available online. The challenge now is to safely open with access to materials as well as the enormous task of providing many services online for students, faculty and patrons.
