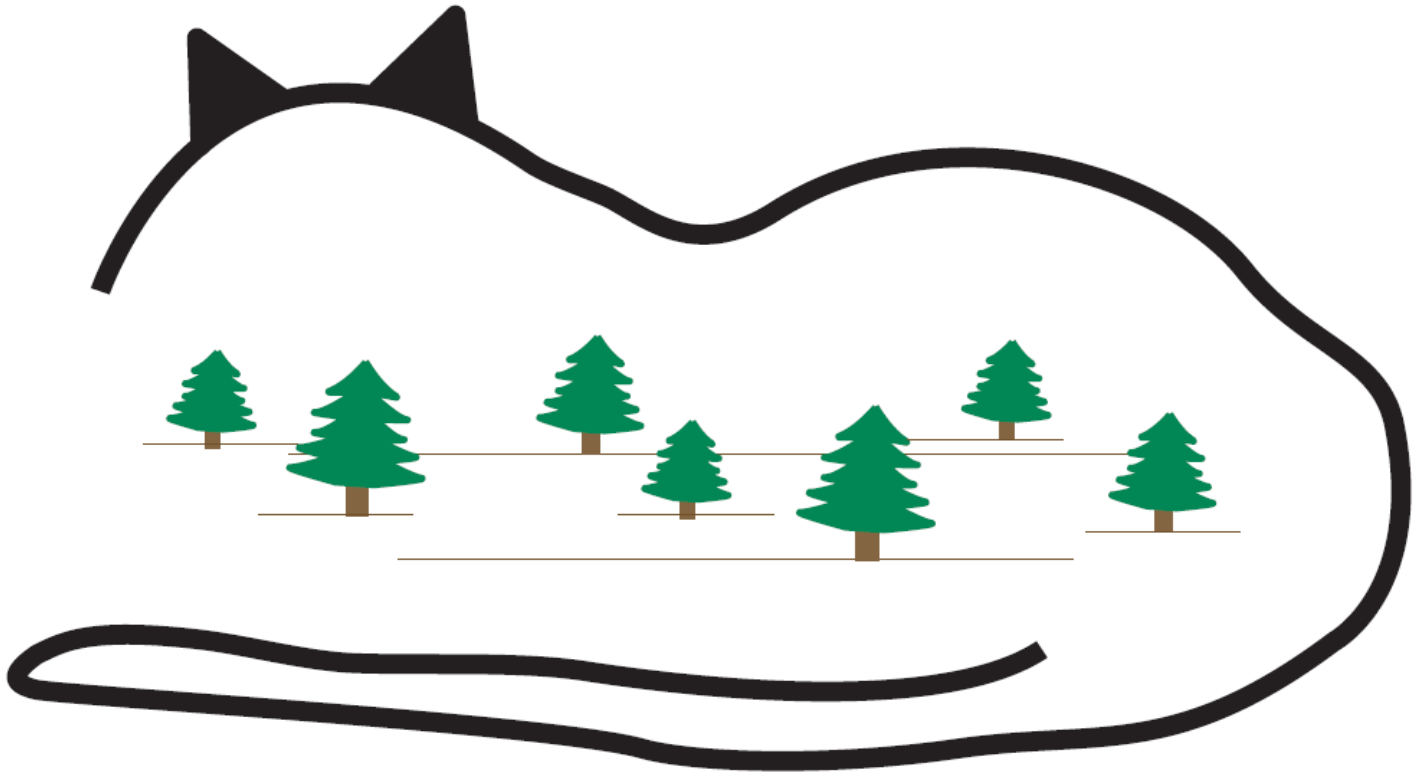

- 1. College Students, What are They Anyway?**

Aimed at library assistants in academic libraries, this workshop explores the concept of “emerging adulthood” referring to young adults 18-29. Understanding what makes this period of the human lifecycle unique can help us better serve this population. How are they different /similar to adolescents and mature adults. How changes in the emerging adult brain influence their thinking and behavior, touching upon both cognitive and moral development.
